

# Care Reflection & Study Notes

### 3.1 Remembrance

### **Purpose**

To show that remembrance is strong in Judaism.

## **Scriptures**

<u>Deuteronomy 32:7</u> – Every generation must recall and retell to the next (<u>I'dor vador in Hebrew</u>).

Examples of the command to remember from Torah include:

Deuteronomy 4:9 – The Revelation at Sinai

Deuteronomy 9:7 – The Golden Calf and Rebelling in the Desert

Deuteronomy 16:3 – The Exodus From Egypt

Deuteronomy 20:8 - The Shabbat\*

<u>Deuteronomy 24:9</u> – Miriam's Negative Speech and Punishment

Deuteronomy 25:17 – Amalek's Attack on Israel

Revelation 15 - Here the 'Song of Remembrance' of Moses (in Deuteronomy 32) is sung

1 Corinthians 11:24-25 – Yeshua continues this theme

### **Bible Study Reflection Questions**

- 1) Why is remembrance so important to Jewish people?
- 2) In your own life can you think of any things that other people have forgotten about, yet you have very well and truly remembered? Why is this?
- 3) Why do you think that God has put the theme of remembrance so clearly in the Bible? What does this say about His character?
- 4) If negative memories are built through emotional connections, what are some of the ways that healthy memories can be created? How does this relate to Jewish evangelism?
- 5) The Song of Moses (<u>Deuteronomy 32:7</u>) contains the command to remember. This is also the song sung in <u>Revelation 15</u>, alongside the Song of the Lamb. What does this tell you about remembrance in God's salvation plan?
- 6) What did Yeshua say to his Jewish disciples at the Jewish Passover? (<u>1 Corinthians</u> <u>11:24-25</u>). Why was that?
- 7) How do you think understanding remembrance impacts on the need to share the Gospel with Jewish people? What are some of your thoughts from this video?

### **Theology Touchpoints**

Remembrance; A Psychological, Philosophical and Biblical Exploration here

#### **Prayer points**

Thank God that he remembers all things, and one day He will bring everything into the light (Luke 8:17). He is a Just Judge (Psalm 96:13).

<u>Pray</u> that Christians would grow in sensitivity when sharing the Gospel. Pray that they may be compassionate around delicate issues that have been remembered by Jewish people.

Intercede for Jewish people – May they know that it is God's desire to save through Yeshua the Messiah, the One who forgives iniquities and remembers sins no more (Jeremiah 31:34).

God is a God who remembers and He calls His people to do the same. Therefore, this is very important in Judaism, even today. Understanding this can help us if Jewish people raise topics of concern that, sadly, the Christian Church has largely forgotten about.
